NCA MEMBER WINS NASA GRANT

Saul Adelmar., a University of Maryland Junior, has been awarded a grant to participate in the 1965 Summer Institute in Space Physics at Columbia University. Saul is among sixty college students who have been awarded grants for the space physics program and a parallel program for engineering students, the Eurmer Institute in Space Science and Engineering.

The winners selected in a nationwide competition are from 45 colleges and 19 states, and from India, Eastern Nigeria, Jordan and Greece. They have received grants which cover the cost of summer tuition at Columbia, a subsistence allowance, round-trip travel from the participant's residence to New York City, and a field trip to U. S. Space Centers, including Goddard.

Saul is a former summer student employee of the Goddard Space Flight Center, who worked under William Bandee in 1963, collecting and reducing data for the TIROS 3 radiation catalogue. He has been a member of NCA for many years and says his interest in space and astronomy began when he was a fifth grade student.
